He is the Board of Directors Chair for Brain Injury Association of Indiana, the Board of Directors Chair for the Indiana Spinal Cord and Brain Injury Research Fund, and Co-Chair for the Indiana Brain Injury Leadership Board. He is a clinical neuropsychologist by training and has been specialized in brain injury rehabilitation since 1982. His research has focused on interventions for people with brain injury, including pharmacological, rehabilitative, and social interventions.
